

According to an article in the May 19, 1960 issue of the "San Francisco Chronicle", a daily San Francisco, California newspaper, [Redacted] was one of the 84 teachers of the Stanford University (SU) faculty who signed a petition asking City Hall to probe the riot in May, 1960.

An advertisement in the "San Francisco Chronicle" dated April 11, 1967, from the Professional Committee of the Spring Mobilization, stated "Join Us - Protest the War in Vietnam - Support the April 15th March. Assemble 10:00 a.m. 2nd and Market - Rally 3:00 p.m. Kezar Stadium", and [Redacted] [Redacted] was listed as a sponsor.

The Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam was an ad hoc organization composed of several anti-Vietnam war and peace groups which organized mass rallies and marches in New York and San Francisco on April 15, 1967, to protest United States involvement in the Vietnam war.

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A Special Agent of the FBI received from a source a list of signers of Statements of Complicity to Violate the Universal Military and Service Act sponsored by the Committee for Draft Resistance, San Francisco. Among the names signing the statement was [Redacted], Berkeley, California.

The Committee for Draft Resistance is self described as an organization formed in the summer of 1967 comprised of persons who volunteer to place themselves in legal jeopardy with draft refusal and persons ineligible for conscription who support all men resisting the draft.

The "San Francisco Chronicle" reported on November 14, 1967, that 22 University of California professors admitted taking part on November 13, 1967, in unauthorized campus rallies and demanded that they not be excluded from punishment. The professors' statement came as part of a rapidly growing movement on the Berkeley campus opposing recommendations by the Dean of Student's Office that 11 students be suspended for their part in unauthorized anti-draft rallies in October, 1967.

[redacted] was one of the 22 professors.

[redacted] attended an "open" steering committee meeting of the Student Mobilization Committee, University of California at Berkeley (UCB), on April 4, 1970, in Eshelman Hall. Discussion was based on the Student Mobilization Committee's plans for the Radiation Laboratory demonstration. Several proposals for violence were made.

The Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (SMC) is controlled by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and its youth affiliate, Young Socialist Alliance. SMC initiates and supports public demonstrations against the war in Southeast Asia.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

According to an article in the July 10, 1970 issue of the "Daily Californian", a UCB newspaper, entitled "Radiation Lab Suspends Maverick Physicist", [redacted] was dismissed for two weeks from Berkeley's Lawrence Radiation Laboratory for organizing an illegal symposium July 2 on science and politics.

According to an article in the "San Francisco Examiner", July 12, 1970, entitled "Free Speech Divides UC Radiation Lab", [redacted] and temporary member of the Laboratory staff, was reprimanded by [redacted] and the faculty Academic Freedom Committee because he said he would not teach students unless they adopted an oath he defined as "learning for the benefit of man". According to the article, [redacted] wants to hold public meetings on topical aspects at the Laboratory. His intransigence on this point led McMillan, Director of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, to impose a two week suspension.

[redacted] argued that the University and the Atomic Energy Commission "should realize that unfettered free speech is a part of a necessary climate of openness that a first-rate scientific laboratory needs in order to thrive".

In an article entitled "Formal Hearing to Resolve Radiation Lab Controversy", in the "Daily Californian", September 10, 1971, it was reported that [redacted] will appeal his suspension from the payroll of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory at a formal hearing.

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The "Daily Californian" reported on February 23, 1971, that [redacted] from Physics said he intends to be arrested in acts of civil disobedience.

On March 4, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed a group of approximately 35 individuals who had gathered at the Berkeley Draft Board, 2101 Grove Street, Berkeley, California. The group picketed, distributed literature, and blocked the side door of the Draft Board. The Draft Board requested that the Berkeley Police Department clear the door.

According to an article in the May 14, 1971 issue of the "Daily Californian" entitled "[redacted] Blasts LRL - Claims Political Firing", [redacted] charged that [redacted]

[REDACTED] overruled a favorable evaluation of his professional work and refused to hire him because of his political views.

[REDACTED] was listed as a representative of the Scientists and Engineers for Social and Political Action at UCB for the fall quarter of 1971.
